

Breakfast Area

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Soon, home work is being done, and while one daughter likes to curl up on a stool against the island where morning breakfast and dairy items are prepared to do her lessons, Mom starts the dinner preparations. "We needed a good-sized kitchen because we really live in it," tells Drorit. "We spend almost all of our time in here as a family and even when we have people over, which is almost every Friday night and Saturday lunch, we tend to congregate in the kitchen." No wonder; the heart of the house looks homey and snug though it is in fact large enough to hold two

sinks and dishwashers as well as two separate preparation areas. "We needed a kitchen that could hold two sets of everything and more," says Drorit, noting that her beautifully detailed cabinets hold three sets of cutlery and dishes (a fourth is in the dining room and a fifth in the pantry), as well as separate pots and pans and baking area. "Our religion really calls for a large kitchen," she adds, "but it is all really used and must be well thought out." For example, granite covers most counter tops in kosher kitchens because boiling hot water can easily be poured over it making

it kosher for passover. Stoves need to have timers that can be programmed to automatically switch on during the Sabbath, when religious laws legislate no work must be done. The butler's pantry needs a sink so the traditional washing of the hands can take place on Shabbat. "I never thought to have anybody but Lauren and her team do the kitchen and addition," explains Drorit, "because I knew she understood the requirements of my religion and would respect my taste." In fact, the kitchen turned out so well, that "my friends have all copied the design," she laughs.

in the house for a few years and gotten a strong sense for what they wanted and needed, the Ratzkers



No problem, replied the designer, who added beams, (built to look old) to the low-height kitchen and filled it with lots of custom, dark walnut cabinets, terra cotta tiles and country French fabrics to create the desired ambience.


The warmth, however, comes also from the family. When the girls come home from school, they hang in the kitchen, munching home-made snacks while lounging around the table.
